

Pastor's Thoughts



s I shared at Congregational Meeting, I have a plan for this year's newsletters celebrate and lift up

something special each month about the church, the work that we do together, what we are accomplishing as God's people, and ways in which we can expand and share these joys with the community around us.

This month, I want to celebrate the work that First Presbyterian Church of Palm Bay does in missions. One of the first things that I learned about the church when I came here to be the pastor was that there was a deep commitment to helping others through the many mission programs of the church, supporting them through giving and in-person volunteering.

To this day, we have volunteers who work with Daily Bread each month. We have members who volunteer their personal time to help at local hospitals, the Sharing Center, Meals on Wheels, go on mission trips, build with Habitat for Humanity, the Women's Center, and more. We collect items, take up offerings, and distribute food and goods to people and organizations throughout the year. And if our recognition gets in the way of carrying out the mission, we shelve

the opportunity to get thank you notes or take pictures for the newsletter and prioritize the help getting to where it is needed.

There is a lot to celebrate when it comes to mission here at FPC. There is the amount that gets done (seriously - every month we are supporting something new), there is the variety of what we are supporting (food, children, housing, migrant workers, clothing, toys, school supplies, and more), and there is the reach of what is supported through the church (local, state, national, and international programs).

It isn't always easy to see the cumulative effect of the programs that we support. Usually, there are small "thank you" articles that will appear in the Chimes in following months, and if you look in the budget documents, you don't see how much comes in and flows out through the designated funds, which is where mission program giving often goes through. I appreciated the Treasurer sharing at the Annual Meeting that in 2022, more than \$25,000 was given through all of the mission programs of the church. That is over 10% of the annual budget.

This year, we would like to do something new to support a longtime partner of the church. The South Brevard Sharing Center is a communitybased agency whose mission is to

support, strengthen, and empower families to achieve self-sufficiency in our area of the county. They do this through food, clothing, household items, and financial vouchers. Our hope is to put together a community event along our street that will see churches, businesses, and families working together to amass items to stock the pantry at SBSC. We want to host a celebration event for this at our church, and I am looking for some volunteers to help me plan this, and to help spread the word along Port Malabar.

In all that we do, we exemplify what it means to love our neighbors as ourselves. And we do our best to make sure that God gets the glory - we choose to partner with programs and organizations who make it clear that it is the love of Christ in our lives that inspires us to be generous with others. Well done, FPC. Let's keep up the good work!



Where Does the 5 Cents a Meal Money Go?

In 2022 your 5 cents helped plant millions of trees and start vegetable gardens in Guatemala and Madagscar; enabled Society of St Andrew and Second Harvest to provide nutritious food for hungry people across Florida, and emergency food relief to thousands of people who lost their homes in the hurricanes.

A portion of Your 5 cents stayed right here in Central Florida Presbytery's own congregations in the form of small grants to churches providing hunger relief in their own communities. Merritt Island, St. Luke's (Titusville) and Markham Woods received small grants in 2022 – "The grant money has and is being used towards our preschool food pantry. The food pantry will be used to help our preschool teachers and families in need." (Merritt Island Church). St. Luke's used their small grant to support their 'Meals for Moms and Dads' program which supplies monthly groceries to 9 families in their community. "The PATH grant also helped us provide a complete Thanksgiving meal to five families, in addition to the monthly groceries.(St Luke's). The PATH committee awarded small grants to two churches in 2023 for their hunger programs, Merritt Island and First Presbyterian, Eustis.

In addition to the small grants, the 12% of donations kept within the Presbytery helps fund a part-time staff person at Presbytery (Barbara Sayles, the Hunger Action Enable), creation of materials like posters and placemats that are made available at no cost to churches, and obtaining envelopes that churches can use for taking up 5 cents a meal donations. The other organizations and amount of support they receive from the 5 cents a meal program are listed below:

Alliance for International Reforestation (20%) AIR's mission is to transform the lives of indigenous Guatemalans, who suffer among the highest malnutrition rates in our hemisphere. Through restoring the timber-stripped mountainsides into fertile land and teaching sustainable farming techniques, AIR breathes life and health into the land and the people. AIR establishes tree nurseries, plants trees, provides environmental education for teachers and farmers, installs cisterns, and builds fuel-efficient brick ovens.

Second Harvest Food Bank (27%) - Second Harvest Food Bank of Central Florida is a private, non-profit organization that collects and distributes donated food to more than 550 non-profit partner agencies in six Central Florida counties: Brevard, Lake, Orange, Osceola, Seminole and Volusia. After opening its new facility in 2012, Second Harvest now distributes approximately 56 million meals every year. PATH funding helps cover freight costs for food distribution.

Society of St. Andrew (21%) - Society of St. Andrew (SoSA) is a private national non-profit organization that partners with local farmers and coordinates thousands of volunteers to enter the fields and groves and even back yards of private homeowners to glean fresh fruits and vegetables that would not be harvested for size or blemish reasons. SoSA distributes 3-4 million pounds of fresh produce to food banks, pantries and shelters. In 2015 SoSA distributed 4.2 mil pounds of nutritious food with 4,029 participating volunteers. PATH funding supports the Florida Regional Gleaning Network.

Madagascar (20%) - Dr. Daniel Turk (Elizabeth) — Madagascar (PC-USA) Mission Workers): In 2015 PATH voted to fund a new project in Madagascar under the leadership of Dan Turk. This project trains Seminary students at Ivato, Mandritsara, Fianarantsoa, and Befeta Seminaries to plant and grow fruit trees and vegetables. This training will be a valuable tool for students when they graduate and pastor churches in rural areas of Madagascar, where growing food is not seen as a hobby or past time, but as an important means of survival and self-sustenance.

Did You Know...

FPC hosts three different groups that support individuals and families that are affected by addiction? We host a Monday afternoon Al-Anon group, a Monday Evening Alcoholics Anonymous meeting for women, and a Thursday night Narcotics Anonymous meeting. All of these groups have expressed appreciation for the church hosting their meetings and take up love offerings to support the church in thanks for the use of the space.

Thank You for Your Support of The Children's Hunger Project in 2022.



With your generous gifts, we are able to provide weekend nutrition to 3,500 deserving students in 53 Brevard County elementary schools each week. Because of donors like you, we move closer to accomplishing our goal of providing essential weekend nutrition to every at-risk Brevard County student. Thank you for joining us as we strive to provide every kid the right to healthy and nutritious food, giving them the opportunity to reach their full potential. So many of the kids we serve do not have the ability to provide for themselves and we willingly take on the task to support their basic need.

Thanks for Supporting Colombia Kids

Here at First Presbyterian, we have been supporting Colombia Kids for a number of years. Colombia Kids was started by the children of Bill and Kathryn Wood, parents of Celia Keen, and longtime missionaries in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church to Colombia, South America. They dedicated their work

to improving the lives of Colombian children. Their efforts lifted children and families from desperate situations to lives of hope and prosperity. Colombia Kids, with the help of donors, continues their legacy by making possible educational opportunities for under served children and families in Colombia.

Currently we have programs running in three cities in Colombia. A Special Offering will be taken on Sunday, February 5th to support this program. Below is a note from them about the work they do.

In Cartagena, 85 children ranging in age from 3 to 16 gather every weekend for art, singing, worship and other activities. The program also serves lunch to 120 children each weekday and breakfast on Sundays, helping to address the difficult economic situation in the community. A recent report in Cartagena noted that 68% of families in Cartagena did not have sufficient resources to provide more than two meals a day for their children. Our Cartagena program helps to fill that gap.

In Armenia, at the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, the Homework Club meets daily with twenty children from disadvantaged and immigrant families with many social and financial needs. Two dedicated professionals provide educational support reinforcing math, reading, English, arts and music. The staff also assists the families of the children with groceries. The program provides healthy snacks and assistance with purchase of school supplies, school shoes and other necessities.

In Cali (pronounced "Collie") we partner with a Methodist church, and the big, exciting news this year is they have expanded by finding a permanent location to host activities right in the neighborhood where the children live. Now, up to 90 children are meeting each Saturday, organized by age group, for homework assistance in math and reading, movie time, monthly birthday celebrations and parenting skills seminars for the parents in the neighborhood. Soon they will be expanding their food service, recognizing that poverty and hunger are a constant threat to the healthy development of the children, by serving eighty special nutritious snacks each Saturday.

Colombia Kids works with their amazing partners, churches and program leaders to serve the children and their families with compassion, love, and great imagination. The financial contributions by First Presbyterian and other churches



and individuals make it all possible. You are putting kids on a positive path to overcome their social and economic challenges.

Lenten Studies: Savior

The Bible uses many images to understand the meaning of Jesus' death and resurrection. But how exactly does Jesus' death on the cross become the means of salvation for those who believe in him? By studying the images in scripture and learning about different theories of atonement, we can deepen our gratitude for Christ's sacrifice and strengthen our commitment to follow him.

The Lenten study this year will use the book Savior by Magret R. deVega, to explore six ways to understand how it is that Jesus' death on the cross provides salvation for us all through examination of various atonement theories. The study will begin on March 1st and run through April 29th. Classes will be held at both noon and 6:00 p.m. and are open for anyone who wishes to attend, so consider bringing a friend to the study.

Sign-up sheets will be in the sanctuary beginning on February 12th. There will be books available for \$5, so we need a good head count of how many people wish to participate. We would also like to bring back the practice of sharing in a simple meal during Lenten studies, so we will be looking for volunteers to make soup and bring in bread each week.

Session Summary

The session met on January 17th. Matters discussed included the following:

- † The audit of the 2021 fiscal year was approved, with recommendations by the auditors for improvements on the instructions also approved.
- † Session approved the hiring out of debris removal from the hurricanes, with an expenditure of up to \$600 from the General Grounds Maintenance line item.
- † John Yust reported on investigations he had done for water flow actuator, which would help prevent leaks in the future. It was approved to spend up to \$1000 from capital reserve funds to get actuators installed for both buildings.
- † The Special Offerings Calendar will be sent out to session members for approval by email, but it was moved and approved to hold the special offering for Colombia Kids on February 5th, and for 5 Cents a Meal offerings to be taken at the last Sunday of each month.
- † It was approved by Session to have communion served the first Sunday of each month through January 2024, as well as Maundy Thursday and Christmas Eve.
- † It was approved to invite Deacons

- to assist with the serving of communion elements in worship services and to shut-ins as needed.
- † The election of Sam Musgrave as Treasurer and Clyde Yust as Clerk of Session for 2023.
- † Treasurer's Report: The end of the year had a strong finish, which puts the church in good position for the coming year. In all areas, expenses were kept under control and the quarterly reviews are helpful in this area.
 - † Average Monthly Expenses: \$18,842.58
 - † Actual Expenses in December: \$16,069.17
 - † Contributions in December: \$22,941.77
 - † Income for 2022: \$219,728.76
 - † Expenses for 2022 \$205,594.28
 - † Surplus end-of-year: \$ 14,134.48

The session adjourned to the Corporation Board meeting. At that meeting, David Collins was elected as president and Jamie Woods was elected to be Vice President in 2023. Sam Musgrave and Clyde Yust will serve as Treasurer and Secretary of the Corporation, respectively, by virtue of their offices.
