## Pastor's Thoughts



When I was younger, I remember seeing signs up this time of year that pronounced March to be a month that came "In like a lion

and out like a lamb." I realize that the reference was to the weather, with the beginning part of the month having potential for late-season winter storms before transitioning to milder, Spring weather. Now, however, any time I see that expression, it strikes me that lions and lambs are both Biblical images for the people of God.

The "lion of Judah" is a national and cultural symbol, symbolizing the tribe of Judah, from which the royal line of kings is drawn. It is based on scripture both in Genesis, when Israel blesses his son Judah, calling him a "young lion." The reference is picked up in the book of Revelation, where Jesus is called the Lion of Judah, and pronounced the only one worthy.

Lambs, on the other hand, can represent both obedient followers (remember they are the "good" guys in the lambs and goats passage) and also are connected to purity and sacrifice, as in the Passover, the sacrificial system in the temple, and also the sacrifice of Christ (John the Baptist calls Jesus the "lamb of God who has come to take away the sins of the world").

If we were to make March a month of lions and lambs in the church, what might that look like? It might begin with having pride in who and whose we are, remembering that we are the children of God in Christ, and that we follow the conqueror of sin and death. And as lambs, well, that is a reminder to be diligent in living out our obedience to Christ and willingness to follow where the Spirit leads us. Even though we do not have to be perfect or "earn" God's love, the ways in which we follow the example given to us in Christ and live under the authority of God help us to be purer people, and the obedience of the flock points to the care and diligence of the shepherd who guides us all.

I hope that during March, you might have an opportunity to do something that helps you to feel like a lion or a lamb, to participate in something that helps you feel like a part of God's family and a follower of Christ. Consider joining us for the Lenten Bible Study on Wednesdays. Volunteer to help with something going on in worship or a mission project of the church. Pray with someone who is struggling. Take confidence in knowing that you are loved by God, saved by Christ, and guided by the Spirit every day. Make your best effort to be bold in proclaiming Christ's grace, and humble in following his ways.

## Shingles Vaccine

Several members of the church have dealt with shingles cases in the last year. We thought it would be helpful to let everyone know that the shingles vaccine is now available to Medicare recipients with Part D (Prescription Plan) for free as of January 1st. It is 2 injections, 2 months apart, and available at most pharmacies. A recommendation from Barbara Musgrave: "We got ours at Publix, no waiting. Sure beats getting shingles!"



<p>March 1 <b>Read Matthew 4:5-6</b> Satan's next challenge is for Jesus to show his mastery over the forces of heaven and impress the people on earth - what do you think he is trying to accomplish? What is the trick?</p>	<p>March 2 <b>Read Matthew 4:7</b> Jesus chooses not to use his divine nature, power, or authority to force his will, but to only use his miraculous power when it will reveal something about God's kingdom and his power.</p>	<p>March 3 <b>Read Matthew 4:8-9</b> Satan now offers Jesus power in the way that the world views it - adulation, riches, political power, armies and kingdoms. What makes this a trap?</p>
<p>March 4 <b>Read Matthew 4:10-11</b> Jesus is the Savior, but he still sees his purpose as pointing back towards God rather than glorifying himself, so this last temptation of Satan is rejected.</p>	<p>March 5 <b>Read John 3:1-2</b> Nicodemus, as a leader of the Jewish people, wants to be nearer Jesus, but doesn't want to risk being seen with him. What makes people hold back from committing to Christ fully?</p>	<p>March 6 <b>Read John 3:2-3</b> Nicodemus wants to know how Jesus is performing these miracles, but Jesus answers with an enigma - you must be born "from above" to wield the power of that kingdom.</p>
<p>March 7 <b>Read John 3:4</b> Nicodemus' answer shows that he does not understand that Jesus is both human and divine, and gets a bit sarcastic imagining how that is possible.</p>	<p>March 8 <b>Read John 3:5-8</b> Jesus firmly states his words are true and offers an image that Nicodemus can understand - the Spirit of God is involved in our Spiritual birth.</p>	<p>March 9 <b>Read John 3:9-11</b> Nicodemus is now ready to learn, but Jesus is frustrated that, as a teacher, he does not already understand, and has previously refused to listen to Jesus, who does have this knowledge.</p>
<p>March 10 <b>Read John 3:12-15</b> Jesus explains why he is the only one who can teach about heavenly things, and in imagery, predicts his death as a means by which others will be saved, like in Number 21:4-9.</p>	<p>March 11 <b>Read John 3:16-17</b> Jesus states clearly his presence and God's plan are based in God's love and desire that there might be salvation instead of condemnation for all who believe.</p>	<p>March 12 <b>Read John 4:5-8</b> This will be a story of surprises. When Jacob met a woman at a well, he later married her. There is a lot of imagery about to be turned upside-down as Jesus speaks to this woman.</p>
<p>March 13 <b>Read John 4:9-10</b> The woman is well aware of the cultural expectations and barriers. Jesus points out there is something more important happening she should be focusing on instead.</p>	<p>March 14 <b>Read John 4:11-15</b> As Jesus engages with the woman, it is clear she is still taking his comments literally rather than grasping that Jesus is speaking of spiritual / eternal matters rather than earthly ones.</p>	<p>March 15 <b>Read John 4:16-26</b> As Jesus speaks directly to her situation, the woman calls him a prophet. She is then open to understanding who Jesus really is and accepts that he is the Messiah.</p>

<p>March 16 <b>Read John 4:27-30</b> The disciples return and they don't know how to react. They don't question Jesus' actions, but neither do they understand them. Meanwhile, the woman evangelizes.</p>	<p>March 17 <b>Read John 4:31-37</b> Now it is time for the disciples to get a lesson. Jesus places doing the work of the Father on an equal level as basic needs like food and invites them to see themselves as workers for God.</p>	<p>March 18 <b>Read John 4:39-42</b> The epilogue of the story reveals that many came to believe and that they welcomed Jesus into their town to stay and teach them. The Samaritans do better than the Jewish people.</p>
<p>March 19 <b>Read John 9:1-7</b> The disciples are interested in a theological debate. Jesus is interested in healing the blind man. How can contemplation of the "why" get in the way of actually helping others?</p>	<p>March 20 <b>Read John 9:8-12</b> Is this comedy or tragedy? The man with sight is nearly unrecognizable. He is eager to share his experience and help others, but he doesn't know where Jesus is to point him out.</p>	<p>March 21 <b>Read John 9:13-17</b> The officials now enter the story, and are divided on whether Jesus is good or evil. How do our perceptions and priorities twist shape the way we interpret events for good or evil?</p>
<p>March 22 <b>Read John 9:18-25</b> The man's parents are now dragged into the picture, but they don't want to get involved in this debate. The leaders want him to praise God and denounce Jesus - best of both worlds?</p>	<p>March 23 <b>Read John 9:26-34</b> The man proclaims Jesus' actions and asks if others wish to follow him. The man can see clearly that any who follow Moses should follow Christ, but he is driven out for his answer.</p>	<p>March 24 <b>Read John 9:35-38</b> Jesus goes and finds the man, helping him to know who has healed him and who he actually is. The man worships Jesus and is reassured that he has done nothing wrong.</p>
<p>March 25 <b>Read John 9:39-41</b> Jesus offers a teaching on these events, and the Pharisees pick up on the criticism aimed their way. Jesus pronounces them the sinners rather than the man born blind.</p>	<p>March 26 <b>Read John 11:1-6</b> Jesus is hiding out from authorities when he receives word his friend is ill. He waits before returning - why do you think he did this? Prior knowledge? Letting things cool off?</p>	<p>March 27 <b>Read John 11:7-16</b> When Jesus sets course for Bethany, he tells the disciples Lazarus is dead. Notice the devotion of Doubting Thomas, who is ready to die with Jesus as he makes his way to Lazarus.</p>
<p>March 28 <b>Read John 11:17-27</b> Lazarus' sister Martha (the worker) reacts with faith to Jesus' appearance, believing that even now Jesus can petition God to save her brother, even though he is four days in the tomb.</p>	<p>March 29 <b>Read John 11:28-32</b> Mary (the listener) is told of Jesus' arrival, and rushes out to see Jesus, but she doesn't make a profession of faith, merely stating that if Jesus were here, Lazarus wouldn't have died.</p>	<p>March 30 <b>Read John 11:33-37</b> When Jesus reaches the tomb, he weeps. Even though he knows what he is going to do, he takes a moment to share in the grief of the people around him for his friend.</p>
<p>March 31 <b>Read John 11:38-42</b> Jesus walks up to the tomb with authority and orders it opened. He makes sure that his prayer is overheard so that all might understand what is happening.</p>	<p>April 1 <b>Read John 11:43-45</b> Jesus commands Lazarus to come out, and he does! Now they must "unbind" him - touching him to remove the grave cloths and, symbolically, welcoming him back.</p>	<p>April 2 <b>Read Matthew 27:11-14</b> Jesus refuses to answer questions and accusations. It is enough that he knows who he is, anyone else may believe or not and act according to what they believe about him.</p>
