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Catch the Tide!

There's a decent part of me that is wondering what to do with this whole month in front of

me. Easter in March, Pentecost in May, what in the world are we going to do with April this year?

Just kidding. I know exactly what is happening in April. It's Eastertide! Sometimes called the Easter Season or Paschaltide, Eastertide is a season in the liturgical year of the Christian church that focuses on celebrating the resurrection of Jesus and also the beginnings of the Church. It traditionally lasts 50 days, from Easter until it ends with Pentecost. The origins of the season are actually drawn from Jewish tradition, as there were 50 days between Pesach (Passover) and Shavu'ot, the Feast of Weeks, which celebrated the giving of the Torah after being freed from slavery in Egypt. Shavu'ot is the reason there were a lot of people in Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost, when the Spirit was given to the disciples.

Eastertide is a bit of an odd season. It isn't a time of preparation, like Advent or Lent, and there aren't a lot of special activities, events, or meanings that are celebrated across

many traditions. In fact, the only thing Protestant churches really do to celebrate the season is to replace the Old Testament Reading with one from the book of Acts in the lectionary (a list of scripture readings appointed for every week in a three-year cycle).

But why let this season pass us by without some kind of recognition? After all, we live near the ocean, and have some experience with paying attention to the Tides, right?

Consider this - if Lent is a "low tide" season that focuses on preparation, penitence, fasting, and holiness, the time between Easter and Pentecost to be celebrated as is something of a "high tide" Celebrating season. the resurrection is of chief importance, yes, but that's just one day. We are called to take our time to look around

and appreciate all the signs of resurrection, life, hope, and joy that can be found this time of year.

Now that we're (hopefully) past some of the worst part of allergy season, we can particularly enjoy the fresh green of leaves on trees, blooming flowers, and fresh fruits making their way into grocery stores. We can eat outside and enjoy the warmth of sun, but also the coolness of shade and breezes. We can appreciate the presence of butterflies, the birth of new animals (did you hear the zoo has a baby sloth and are anticipating the birth of baby coatis?), and many other examples of ways that we can be witnesses to the glory and grace of God.



Eastertide is not a time of obligation or hard work, or obligations of piety. It is a time of celebration that God is good, that life prevails over death, that grace wins out over sin, that we all have new beginnings and opportunities. I pray we all have a lovely Eastertide season!



Hummingbird Cake



FOR THE CAKE
2 c. all-purpose flour
1 1/3 c. granulated sugar
1 tsp. ground cinnamon
3/4 tsp. salt
3/4 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. baking powder
1 c. canola oil
2 large eggs, beaten
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
2 8-oz. cans crushed pineapple in juice, undrained
2 ripe bananas, chopped
1 c. chopped pecans
Nonstick baking spray with flour
FOR THE FROSTING
3/4 c. unsalted butter, softened
8 oz. cream cheese, softened
4 c. powdered sugar

1 tsp. vanilla extract

Pinch of salt

FOR DECORATING

1 c. toasted pecan halves



Directions

SAVE RECIPE

For the cake: Preheat the oven to 350°.

2 Whisk together the flour, sugar, cinnamon, salt, baking soda, and baking powder in a large bowl. Stir in the oil, eggs, vanilla, and pineapple until evenly combined. Mash the bananas then add to the bowl with the pecans. Stir to combine.

- 3 Spray 2 (8-inch) round baking pans with nonstick baking spray (or, butter and flour the pans). Divide the batter evenly between the prepared pans. Bake in the preheated oven until a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out with just a few small crumbs, 33 to 37 minutes. Cool the cakes in the pans on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Invert the cakes onto the wire rack and cool completely, about 1 hour.
- For the frosting: Beat the butter and cream cheese in a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment on medium until smooth and creamy, 2 to 3 minutes. Add the powdered sugar then mix at low speed just until combined. Scrape the sides and bottom of the bowl. Add the vanilla and salt. Beat frosting on medium-high speed until light and fluffy, about 2 minutes.
- 5 Place one of the cake layers on a serving plate and top with about 1 cup of the frosting, spreading evenly to the edge. Top with the second cake layer. Spread the remaining frosting on the top and sides of the cake.
- 6 To decorate the cake: Press the pecan halves along the base of the cake and around the top of the cake to create a ring. Slice and serve.
