Pastor's Thoughts



Preparing for Sabbatical and Renewal—what is going on and how will it work?

Sabbatical plans are very much underway, both at my home (we're breaking in new shoes for our trip) and here at the church. As part of these plans, we want to make sure the congregation is aware of the preparations happening now.

First, for those who are unsure what Sabbatical is, it is a practice related to keeping the Sabbath—much like we are supposed to put aside a day every week to connect with the Lord, Sabbatical is a leave taken approximately every seven years in which a pastor re-connects to the Lord, their sense of call, and re-commits to their ministry. It involves *ceasing* work and the need to accomplish, be productive, or be in control of things. Then, the pastor *embraces* time, rest, wholeness, inspiration, and hope as a means of renewing the self. Finally, it should lead to *feasting* - an ability to appreciate and be grateful to all that has led up to the present moment and joyous anticipation of the future God is planning. It's not a vacation; it is a ministry to the pastor so they can be all God intends them to be with and for the congregation.

The Renewal Team are meeting regularly with me working on the plans for the church for this summer. Our first

priority was ensuring steady pastoral care for the congregation. To this end, we have brought in Rev. David Lindemer to be our Extended Pulpit Supply pastor. He will preach throughout June and July, provide pastoral care as needed, and will even have office hours on Thursdays from 9:30 until 12:00 in order to be available to the congregation.

The Deacons have worked with me to prepare a Pastoral Care plan, one that we want to bring into effect now, in the month of May, as a way of test-running the plan before my Sabbatical Plan begins. If anyone in the congregation is sick, hospitalized, or is otherwise in need of pastoral care, they should reach out to the following three people:

These persons will be able to contact the rest of the Deacons and Rev. Lindemer in order to arrange phone calls, visits, or support as needed.

If there is anything we can do to help the congregation feel encouraged or empowered about the Renewal time coming up, please talk with me or a member of the Renewal Team (Marsha Corton, Barbara Musgrave, Sue D'Imperio, and Nancy Cox)!

Renewal Activity Timeline

June 1: Leave-Taking Celebration with Pastor Debra after worship

June 1-30: CAT Assessment portal open for members and friends to help our renewal process by answering questions related to the church

July date to be determined: Guest speaker focusing on about ministry opportunities as an older congregation

August: Pastor Debra will return to the office on the 11th and will share about her Sabbatical time during the month.

September date to be determined: Representative from Holy Cow! Will be sharing results of our CAT assessment with the congregation.



Spiritual Gifts: Manifestation



In last month's Chimes, there was an article about how to understand personal Spiritual Gifts

– using the scripture in Romans 12:1-8, it discussed identifying the things that you are passionate about and seeing that inspiration as motivational gifts of the Spirit.

This month, let's look at another list of gifts found in Scripture, this time in 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, as a way of considering Spiritual Gifts through the lens of manifestation – outward expressions of God's presence and power working in the lives of believers. One way to think of them are like abilities, but they don't come from our own efforts or intentions, but rather are gifts given by the Holy Spirit that remind us and those around us that God is able to do more through us than we can accomplish on our own. These gifts exist to promote the common good, build up the body of Christ, help people grow in their faith, and demonstrate the power of God on earth.

Next month, there will be a breakdown of the gifts mentioned in 1 Corinthians 12, but before sharing those descriptions, consider the following question: what have you seen or done that, if asked about, you would say, "It is definitely God at work, because there is no way I could do that in my own power!" That's the first clue to identifying these gifts!

Session Summary

The session met on April 15th. Matters discussed included the following:

- The session was introduced to David Lindemer and approved the Extended Pulpit Supply contract for June and July. This contract is for preaching, session moderation, and pastoral care while Debra is on sabbatical.
- Session approved the following pulpit supply preachers: Lucas Pina on April 27, Dr. Carmelo Mercado on August 3, and Olivia and Hoover Haney on August 10.
- Session reviewed, discussed, and approved policy updates, including an overhaul of our Employee Policies and Procedures, an update to our Sexual Harassment and All Forms of Harassment policy, revising our Policy for Guest and Pulpit Supply Preachers, and updating committee responsibility descriptions for the Fellowship and Buildings and Grounds (formerly Property) committees.
- Session approved a contract with Holy Cow! Consulting to run a CAT assessment with the congregation during June as part of the renewal activities planned for the congregation.
- Session approved a request from the Platinum Show Chorus to meet in the sanctuary for practices on Thursday evenings from 5:30 to 9:30 p.m. on a trial basis for 6 months.

May 1st is the National Day of Prayer

The first Thursday in May is an official day designated to be a National Day of Prayer. The theme for this year is “Pour Out to the God of Hope and Be Filled” and is based on Romans 15:13 – “May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.”

On this day, it is particularly appropriate to be in prayer for the nation – here are some prayer prompts for your use in home or as part of a wider celebration of the day:

Prayers for the government and people in office: President, Congress, Supreme Court, Governors, State Congresses, Mayors, County Officials, and other elected leaders. You can pray for their wisdom, integrity, and servanthood.

Prayers for responsible citizenship, courts of justice, stewardship of the nation, reconciliation of divisions, educators and students, and safety of our military and first responders.

<p>May 1 Read Revelation 1:5b-6 Everything that Jesus did for us: freeing us, making us one, giving us purpose—everything was done because Christ loves us. His love drives his actions, which then elicits our praise.</p>	<p>May 2 Read Revelation 1:7 When Jesus returns, every eye will see him—there will be no doubt, no prevarication, and nowhere to hide from the truth, especially for those who have rejected Christ.</p>	<p>May 3 Read Revelation 1:8 Does verse 8, spoken in God’s own voice, ring differently than the same words from verse 4? How is it different to hear God proclaim he was, is, and is to come than to say it ourself?</p>
<p>May 4 Read Acts 9:1-2 Saul passionately believed those who followed Jesus, known as followers of the Way, were offensive to God and actively damaging the community with their teachings. Is it any wonder he was eager to persecute them?</p>	<p>May 5 Read Acts 9:3-6 As soon as the Lord’s presence came upon Saul, he knew it and fell to the ground in reverence. But the voice he heard was Jesus’ talking to him—not to condemn him, but to give him instructions on what to do next.</p>	<p>May 6 Read Acts 9:7-9 Saul was the only one who heard Jesus speak and had this peculiar encounter. Do you think his subsequent fasting was from injury, penitence, preparation, or some other reason?</p>
<p>May 7 Read Acts 9:10-14 God sends Ananias to heal Saul, giving Saul a vision of this event before he speaks to Ananias, who is not eager to heal, let alone come into the presence of a man who is hunting the disciples of Jesus. What would you say?</p>	<p>May 8 Read Acts 9:15-16 God reveals that he has plans for Saul—rather than a threat, God sees him as an instrument to speak the Gospel message. God has plans for Saul, whose passion to follow God will lead him into danger.</p>	<p>May 9 Read Acts 9:17-19a Ananias is not going to argue further—God knows exactly whom he is saving. By the time Ananias meets Saul, he is ready to call him brother. Saul responds to his healing with baptism and a new purpose.</p>
<p>May 10 Read Acts 9:19b-20 Paul’s ministry and missionary trips are still a ways off in the future. But at this point in time, after his encounter with Jesus and a few days with disciples, he is eager to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues as the Son of God!</p>	<p>May 11 Read Revelation 7:9 Can you imagine a multitude with people from all tribes and peoples and languages? What colors and outfits might you see? What sounds might you hear? In their many different way, all praise the Lord!</p>	<p>May 12 Read Revelation 7:10 The one thing acknowledged by all is that God and Jesus are the only ones who determine and administer salvation—what does that mean for us on Earth as we try to teach people how to follow Christ?</p>
<p>May 13 Read Revelation 7:11-12 It is not just the martyrs or the countless believers that worship the Lord in heaven—the angels, the elders (Saints? Patriarchs? Leaders?), and the “four living creatures” lay aside any honor or glory they have in order to praise the Lord on his throne.</p>	<p>May 14 Read Revelation 7:13-15 When finished with their praise, attention is now given to the observer, John. He is checking to see how much John understands or what he needs explained—not for his own edification, but so that he can report this back to other believers.</p>	<p>May 15 Read Revelation 7:16-17 The martyrs know that Jesus has saved them, and they praise him constantly for it, turning to Jesus to be their guide, protector, comforter, and friend. It isn’t a reward, it is an extension of the way they lived their life on Earth.</p>

<p>May 16 Read Acts 9:36-38</p> <p>How much must have her community loved Tabitha, that they sent for Peter even after her death! What might they be expecting him to do—save her or help them mourn her?</p>	<p>May 17 Read 9:39-42</p> <p>Peter comes right away, and must pass by a line of people, showing Tabitha's impact on them. He doesn't even hesitate once he is in her presence to call her to wake up.</p>	<p>May 18 Read Psalm 148:1-4</p> <p>People used to imagine that God lived in the sky, so it makes sense to command the things closest to him—sun and moon—to praise. What would you command to praise God?</p>
<p>May 19 Read Psalm 148:5-8</p> <p>As the psalmist begins to think about the things God created, they encourage that creation to call out in praise both for making and directing them, even to this day.</p>	<p>May 20 Read Psalm 148:9-12</p> <p>The psalmist names large groups and specific examples to exemplify how God understands both the "big picture" and is still personally invested in every aspect of creation.</p>	<p>May 21 Read Psalm 148:13-14</p> <p>We should praise the Lord because he is worthy of praise—and he chooses to devote himself to the love and care of his people. Yet another reason to praise him!</p>
<p>May 22 Read John 13:33</p> <p>Jesus then tells his disciples he is going somewhere they cannot follow—they will have to figure out how to live, teach, and serve without him present to guide them.</p>	<p>May 23 Read John 13:34-35</p> <p>The last instruction Jesus has for them is not what to teach, how to teach, or who to teach.
