Pastor's Thoughts—Holy Cow Presentation



On Sunday, September 28th, we heard a presentation about the results of the CAT survey from our Holy Cow

consultant. Thank you to everyone who stayed after church in order to be a part of the discussions and to hear about our data.

For the next couple of months, this column will share some of that information again – in part, to summarize it for those who weren't present, but also to serve as a reminder for all of us as to what we learned, as there was a lot of information shared quickly.

Our church was labeled as one that is "clergy-focused" – what does that mean? It's not a good or bad thing, it is a descriptive label that indicates that the highest areas of focus expressed during the survey were actions or responsibilities traditionally associated with the clergy – preaching, pastoral care, vision casting, etc. Other label options include "power-focused" (the work of the decision-making group), and "ministry-focused" (work associated with various ministries or committees of the church).

Some advice we've received about this facet of our church is that this kind of focus is conducive to being able to make needed changes, and is also fertile ground for growth, both internally (better connections) and externally (growth in numbers). It can leave us vulnerable to anxiety and conflict, as a lot rides on the perceived success or likeability of one person. To address this, building strong accountability, agency, and leadership development skills throughout the church strengthens our stability.

We also learned about "drivers" in our church – the parts of our life together that help people to feel satisfied and also excited, energetic, or passionate about what is going on. The idea of the drivers is to be aware that when certain things within the church are done well (in our case, preaching, quality CE opportunities, small group opportunities, visible pastoral leadership), we have a heightened sense of peace, fulfillment, cooperation, meaning, and belonging.

When we do other things well, like having the pastor articulate a clear vision and keep it at the forefront of our attention, or working

together on discerning gifts for ministry, the energy level of the church goes up – we get excited about what's going on in the life of the church. We have a bigger sense of purpose, we feel passionate about what we are doing.

Knowing this information will help all of us pay attention to where we need to put in some initial work: building up the practices and programs that impact the congregation the most in order to promote engagement, connection, and rally everyone together before taking our next steps forward.

It's the Great Pumpkin!

Stewardship Sunday 10/26

During October you will be receiving information about our Stewardship campaign for 2026. Our theme this year will be "Stepping Out in Purpose and Passion," based on 2 Corinthians 5, which talks about living in faith, sharing Christ with others, and being new creations and ambassadors for Christ in the world.

The emphasis of our Stewardship program will be asking the congregation to committing to the journey of the next year, when we will be taking the information we collected from the CAT survey, continuing to have conversations with the church about our identity, priorities, and aspirations, creating a vision for the next 3 years, and taking action to ensure that we respond to what you have shared is important to the church to put some work into our worship, Christian Education, and outreach ministries.

We don't have the vision plan mapped out and ready to present to the congregation in a neat PowerPoint presentation. But we will be doing more than talking 2026—we will be taking our first steps in a committed direction. We are asking the congregation to commit to walking with us on that journey, one that will be marked with clear purpose and exciting passion.

On Sunday, October 26th, we will be asking the congregation to make a commitment to this journey with estimates of giving and participation interest forms—a way of saying, "I'm interested in walking with you." We hope you will come!

Session Summary

Session met on Tuesday, September 16th. Topics addressed included the following:

- Session voted to instruct our bookkeeper to pay out benevolences as budgeted for the remainder of the year – we had been looking at finances closely this year and were deciding quarter-by-quarter what we could do based on our resources. We feel confident that we can afford to pay our benevolences fully for the rest of the year at this point.
- Session approved a motion to update check signers with our bank.
- Session agreed to begin discussions with the person who cleans for the school about expanding their responsibilities to include church needs.
- Treasurer's Report: We saw a slight increase in August due to consistent, generous giving and careful monitoring of expenditures. We still intend to use any surplus at the end of the year to build up our Reserve Fund that pays for repairs to the church, since we did not purchase wind coverage in 2025.
 - Average Monthly Expenses: \$17,222.32
 - Actual Expenses in August: \$13,198.77
 - Contributions in August: \$13,580.52
 - Income year-to-date: \$137,834.15
 - Expenses year-to-date: \$122,970.31
 - Surplus year-to-date: \$14,863.84

They also spent time in the Visitor's Center, on "broom and shovel duty" and also assisting park personnel with maintenance and safety work, like putting in snow poles or reminding people they can't hold up traffic to take pictures of the wildlife.

In their free time, John and Monia hiked the park and continued their explorations of the nearby area, including Jackson Hole, and attend a star party (the moon didn't help). They also keep their eyes open for animals to see, and they see a lot! Beautiful pictures of bison, bears, coyotes and elk—Monia finally got a view of some really impressive antlers!

Near the end of the month, they got a new camera, so expect even more pictures in their next updates! They aren't sure what a potential shutdown will mean for the park or their time there, so keep them in prayer for now while they wait to see what happens.

IN THE WORD

Daily Devotion

October 1 Read Colossians 2:13-14 Jesus died for our sins before we were believers, and while still Gentiles for the Corinthians. If Jesus was ready to claim them as they were then, they don't need to change now.	October 2 Read Colossians 2:15 Whereas many would see Jesus' death on the cross as shameful and lowering, Paul says that it was the powers of the world that were revealed as weak by the cross.	October 3 Read Luke 17:5-10 Do you sometimes think your faith is too small to accomplish anything? Even tiny amounts of faith can accomplish astounding things, if we are bold enough to put it in action!
October 4 Read Luke 17:6-5 What do you think it means to "increase" one's faith? Can it be done, and if so, how? What part of this work is your responsibility, and whose help do you need to succeed?	October 5 Read Psalm 66:1-4 The psalmist invites all to praise the Lord for what he has already done. Does this kind of praise easily spring to mind for you?	October 6 Read Psalm 66:5-7 If examples of God's works aren't immediately remembered, we are invited to look around and see what he is up to!
October 7 Read Psalm 66:8-12 All the people are invited to direct their attention and their praise back to God, as even the psalmist turns and directs his words to the Lord.	October 8 Read Luke 17:11-14 Jesus sends the lepers to the priests to be declared clean even before they showed signs of healing – going to them was an act of faith!	October 9 Read Luke 17:15-16 Only the Samaritan stops to return – perhaps the others were in a hurry to be restored to their community by seeing the priests?
October 10 Read Luke 17:15-17 Of all who were made clean, only one returns to thank Jesus. Why do we so quickly forget those who help us, or neglect to thank them? What was different about the one man who returned and gave thanks?	October 11 Read Luke 17:19 The man who came back is sent back to live again in the community. How do you think this experience will have changed him? What might inform his future relationships with former friends or new acquaintances?	October 12 Read Luke 18:9-14 Read the entire parable, then focus on verse 9 – Why do you think Jesus addressed these people specifically? How is he hoping they will act after they hear his message?
October 13 Read Luke 18:10 If you did not know anything about the two men mentioned, what assumptions might you make because of their jobs? What judgments do we make about people's relative goodness or morality based on their position in life?	October 14 Read Luke 18:10-12 Does the prayer of the pharisee sound like a righteous man's prayer? If not, what is wrong with what he is saying? Where is there a disconnect between all of the good things he has done and not being considered the good person in the parable?	October 15 Read Luke 18:13 What emotion characterizes the tax collector's prayer? Is that a good thing or bad? Why might this prayer be pleasing? How is it that sometimes shame can lead us to repentance, and other times keep us away from seeking forgiveness?

October 16 Read Luke 18:14 What is the main point of the parable Jesus told? How do you think it was received by Jesus' audience—would they be likely to embrace it's lesson?	October 17 Read Luke 18:9-14 Having studied the parable, read it again and honestly explore this question: with whom do you identify most in this story?	October 18 Read Luke 18:9-14 How can the people of the church seek to be righteous without falling into the trap of the pharisee? What does that look like?
October 19 Read Psalm 65:1-2 How often do you think of God as being your father or friend? Judge of all creation? How does our image of God affect our prayers?	October 20 Read Psalm 65:3-10 In your contemplations of God, do you often focus on his personality or his actions? Which help you feel safe or loved?	October 21 Read Psalm 65: 11-13 What are the effects of God's presence and action on the world around him? How can you help create or nurture something similar?
October 22 Read Luke 18:1-8 Read this entire parable and then read the first verse again. Who is Jesus speaking to and why would they need this message?	October 23 Read Luke 18:2-3 Who are the characters in this story, and who has the power in this relationship? What should be done with that power?	October 24 Read Luke 18:2-5 What is it that causes the judge to act? Are his reasons the most important part of the story, or his actions?
October 25 Read Luke 18:6-8 What is the expectation someone might have of an authority who is just and loving over one who is selfish or unfair?	October 26 Read Romans 1:16-17 Why was it revolutionary that Paul wrote about faith being the essential part of salvation and not heritage or actions?	October 27 Read Romans 2:13-16 What is the difference between hearing the law and doing the law? Why is doing more important, if faith is all that is needed?
October 28 Read Romans 3:10-12 Why is it that knowing everyone is a sinner both a burden and a relief? What does it mean for creating community?	October 29 Read Romans 3:21-25 What do you think Paul means when he says, "there is no distinction?" Is it between people, or sins? Do you agree?	October 30 Read Romans 4:13-17 What would it mean to have a faith inheritance? God's promise does not go through blood, but by faith – how can it be passed down?
October 31 Read Romans 5:1-5 Read carefully for the verbs in this passage to understand the effects of our redemption and also of suffering for the faith—what did you learn?	November 1 Read Ephesians 1:11-12 Have you received an inheritance before? A trait, a skill, or financial support? What was your relationship with the person who gave it to you?	November 2 Read Ephesians 1:13-14 If the Holy Spirit is a seal and a pledge, consider this—what quality, ability or interest do you most closely associate with having the Holy Spirit at work in you?
