## 2026: A Year to Come and See!

As I worked on articles for this edition of the newsletter, I kept

thinking about what kind of tone I wanted to set for the year, and praying about what message we might need to hear as individuals and congregation.

I was pretty excited to be starting on a series of advertisements for the church to help make the work that we do known to the community around us (there's one example on this very page!).

Members of session had this idea as they were brainstorming things we needed to do in response to the congregational assessment data, and one idea was doing more to announce the good works being done here. We settled on the theme of announcing FPC Palm Bay as "A small church that does big things".

I love this idea. I think it captures the spirit of the people here so well—we may be small, but that doesn't stop us from loving God, each other, and our neighbors with

all that we have. And there is plenty of light and hope that we bring into this world that we shouldn't be hiding or keeping to ourselves.

But I felt there was something missing at the same time—announcing what we have done doesn't in itself invite involvement with ongoing and future action. I was looking for a way to see these moments as snapshots of a journey that is continuing to move forward, one that more people can become a part of.

Then I came across John 1:38-39, when Jesus starts being followed by disciples, and he asks, "What are you looking for?" When they ask where he is staying, Jesus tells them, "Come and see."

I think a lot of people are looking for something, both in the world and in the church. Whether someone has never heard of Jesus or have strived to serve him from the first days they remember, we are seekers—of wisdom, grace, forgiveness, belonging. And when we

bring that longing to Jesus, he smiles, gestures for us to follow long, and invites us to "Come and see," confident that we will find what we are looking for as we follow him.

As a church, we're going to be sharing more about what we do here, but it's going to be accompanied by invitation—Come and See. Jump in, get involved, and experience for yourself what it means to learn, to grow, to serve, to share. Come and See how it is we can be a Small Church that Does Great Things, and how each of us can be a vital part of those acts of love and light in this world.

## Per Capita 2026

The per capita rate for 2026 will be \$28.26 per active member, divided between General Assembly, Synod, and Central Florida Presbytery. The church pays this apportionment amount out of our general fund, but members may choose to offset their per capita amount if they so desire. If you wish to make a contribution to Per Capita, you can use the designated envelope or indicate your wish in a check's memo line.

## Star Words

The past few years, we have participated in a practice called "star words" connected to the celebration of Epiphany, which marks the visit of the magi to Jesus after his birth in Bethlehem. It commemorates both the star which guided them to find Jesus as well as the gifts they gave of gold, frankincense and myrrh. Participants select a word to be both a gift and a guide for a year – a way to look for God's presence and activity in our lives and a way for us to respond in gratitude and faith. Star Words will be available in worship on Sunday, January 4th, and we will have them in the office afterwards if anyone would like to get one!



## Session Summary

The session met on December 16th. Matters discussed included the following:

- Session voted on several leave requests from Pastor Debra during the first part of the year, including approving a week working from home at the end of January, sabbatical travel February 2-8, study leave to attend a conference in Orlando February 9-11, and vacation leave May 11-17.
- Session was informed of dates Pastor Debra will be unavailable or traveling due to responsibilities associated with being a commissioner to General Assembly, including online committee meeting June 22-24 and plenary sessions June 27-July 2.
- Session approved a motion from the Admin committee to have the bookkeeper transfer any surplus as of 12/31, less \$1000 to the Capital Reserve fund.
- Session approved a motion from the Admin committee to increase the Pastor's compensation 2.5% in 2026. All other staff already had an increase to their salaries in the submitted budget.
- Session approved a motion from the Mission committee to send \$500 in support to Dan and Elizabeth Turk, missionaries in Madagascar.
- Session approved Preliminary Guidelines for potentially disruptive interactions. These will continue to be examined, reviewed, and revised in the months to come.
- Disruptions to worship are not permitted and persons being disruptive may be asked to leave.
- Recording of church events by persons other than church personnel requires prior approval by Session, customarily requested when seeking approval for building usage (i.e. memorial services, weddings, etc.) or for sacraments (i.e. baptism).
- Official comments from the church may only come from Session. Any individual, including staff and Session members, cannot speak on behalf of the church unless they are sharing a message approved by Session.
- Session approved motions from the Worship committee related to communion:
- Session approved communion to be held the first Sunday of the month through January, 2027, as well as Maundy Thursday and Christmas Eve.
- Session approved Deacons to assist Elders as needed in distributing elements for worship services and home communion.
- Session approved the 2026 budget as amended
- Session approved applying for a renewal of the Palmdale Legacy Grant, which would help offset costs related to the Medical Plan for the pastor.
- Treasurer's Report: Contributions remain strong and expenses under control. The bookkeeper will soon be moving the \$8,500 insurance payment to capital reserves in accordance with a Session decision at the November meeting.

  - Contributions in November: \$19,370.16
  - Income year-to-date: \$191,996.22
  - Expenses year-to-date: \$174,725.02
  - Surplus year-to-date: \$17,271.20

# IN THE WORD

## Daily Devotion

We're trying something new this month—please give feedback as to whether you prefer the weekly format or you'd like us to go back to daily devotions! Thank you :)

**December 28th through January 3rd:**

**Read Matthew 2:13-23 & Isaiah 63:7-9**

The story of the magi's visit to Jesus is not all frankincense and myrrh. It also includes a terrible story known as the "slaughter of the innocents," a desperate act of Herod to eliminate the threat of a rightful king. While Jesus is protected by his family being sent away with a warning, and returning once it is safe, this story is one that connects the grief of the people of Jesus' time with the experience of the descendants of Israel in Egypt, where they were enslaved and their children similarly sentenced to death out of fear. This week, consider that the power of the message of hope and restoration is connected to the depth of hurt and grief experienced.

- While we all may share experience with grief, each loss is different and personal to the person experiencing it. How do we connect and offer comfort and hope when we never fully understand another's particular pain?
- Isaiah talks about how the rescue of God's people was not accomplished through messenger, but by his presence—how does the personal action of God in rescue and restoration make his action more powerful?
- How do we share in the relief at one person's healing, or joy another person's miracle, along with the pain of disappointed hopes of someone who feels their prayer wasn't answered? How can we be present for them?
- **January 1:** Consider the gifts brought by the Magi to Jesus—Gold was the appropriate gift for a king. What gifts has God given you that reveal your value?
- **January 2:** Frankincense was a fragrant perfume commonly used in Temple worship as incense. What gifts or insights do you have that help you worship the Lord?
- **January 3:** Myrrh was used for embalming the dead, and was a foreshadowing of Jesus' death and resurrection. What gifts, practices, or beliefs do you have that prepare you for the eternal life before you?

**January 4th through January 10th**

**Read Genesis 1:1-5 and John 1:1-9**

Since it is the beginning of a new year, let's read some of the first verses in Old Testament and verses from John's gospel that cover the time before creation itself. Before all things, there was God, yet God was not alone—Jesus, the Word, was there, and the Spirit was active in creation as well. The divine dance of creating, redeeming, and sustaining has been the character and work of God since before there was time, before there were stars and planets, and will continue until the end of all things. God is the steadyng force of the universe, who brings order to chaos and light to darkness.

- **January 4:** What do you think it means that Jesus is called the Word of God in John 1? What is the relationship between a spoken word and its speaker?
- **January 5:** John teaches that the Jesus was part of every act of creation. Jesus knows how to redeem us completely because he knows exactly how we are made.
- **January 6:** In Genesis, God's Spirit is active in the midst of chaos and darkness. Why do you think light is the first act of creation?
- **January 7:** John specifically points out that the darkness was not able to overcome the light that Jesus brought. What kinds of darkness have you needed to struggle against, and how can this statement bring you hope?
- **January 8:** Genesis says that after creating it, "God saw the light was good." Why is light important in our life? How is Jesus like light in our lives?
- **January 9:** In Jewish tradition, sundown is the start of a new day, because in creation there was darkness before light. Have there been any times when a day is ending, and you are ready to put it behind you and start again? You don't need to wait for the dawn for that to happen!
- **January 10:** In preparation for Jesus' arrival, God sent John to testify to the light. How can you carry forward the work of being a witness to the light of Christ?

# First Presbyterian Church of Palm Bay Daily Devotion

## January 11th through the 17th:

### Read Acts 10:34-43

This sermon of Peter's is an incredible summary of the foundational beliefs of the church, from its inception to this very day. It covers major moments: Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, as well as the ministry given to all who follow him and the promise of grace given to us. This week, consider why each detail was considered important enough to include in this summary, and what the purpose was in sharing it with this group of people at this time. What can we still learn as believers and disciples of Christ?

- **January 11:** Notice the audience Peter is speaking to—Gentiles. This is why Peter emphasizes that God shows no partiality!
- **January 12:** Why is someone you might need to reassure that they are deserving of God's love?
- **January 13:** Jesus' ministry may have started in Judea, but was now spreading throughout the world. Where can you take it?
- **January 14:** Peter mentions “we are witnesses” - why is it important for a listener to hear a story from someone personally involved?
- **January 15:** Who is it that Peter says Jesus appeared to? Why not to all people?
- **January 16:** It is significant that Jesus ate and drank with those he appeared to—it proved he was real (not a ghost), but also sharing table with someone was significant in that time—why?
- **January 17:** The last two verses contain both the summary of what we are all to proclaim and the assurance of “experts” (prophets) that what is promised is true. Why was it important to include both?

## January 18th through 24th:

### Read John 1:29-42

This passage is John the Baptist's testimony about the appearance of the Holy Spirit at Jesus' baptism and an account of the first disciples of Jesus, one of whom had been a follower of John the Baptist. As his role comes to an end, consider the ways in which John the Baptist continues to be the one who continues to point others to Jesus and prepares the way for him. How did John's work help to shape the ministry around Jesus, and how did his attitude become an example for others?

- **January 18:** Any time John sees Jesus, his message is all about him. What does it mean that Jesus is called the Lamb of God by John?
- **January 19:** John credits Jesus for being the reason he started baptizing in the first place, not claiming any credit for himself for the ministry he has built up.
- **January 20:** John continues to tell the story of the Spirit descending on Jesus—what is a story about you and God that you continue to tell?
- **January 21:** How important do you think it was that John the Baptist continually vouched for Jesus at the beginning of his ministry?
- **January 22:** Jesus' first disciples were originally followers of John the Baptist. How do you think he felt about their transfer of loyalty?
- **January 23:** How did Jesus react to the disciples starting to follow him? He makes no promises, just offers an invitation to observe and decide if they want to follow.
- **January 24:** What do you think Andrew saw that made him fetch his brother to follow Jesus also?

## January 25th through 31st:

### Read 1 Corinthians 1:10-18

As Paul begins the substance of his letter to the church of Corinth, he doesn't lead off with exhortation or instruction. Rather, he jumps right to the elephant in the room—there are divisions within the church and jockeying for status. Paul seems to imply that if these problems are not addressed, there is no value in offering any other teaching. This week consider how handling conflict is one of the most difficult things to do, as individuals, families, and churches, yet it is essential to our life together to address.

- **January 25:** Paul's first step in addressing the problem of division is by reminding everyone they are connected in Jesus Christ.
- **January 26:** Paul uses the phrase “knit together” - a process where different strands are knotted together to form a greater whole.
- **January 27:** How are Paul's opening statements helpful for thinking about conflict resolution today?
- **January 28:** As Paul names the ways people are dividing himself, he points out the implications of each statement—Christ divided, Paul as savior—and points out the way such statements are a false teaching.
- **January 29:** As Paul acknowledges who in the church he baptized, he is owning up to where he may have contributed to the possibility of this conflict, while still condemning it.
- **January 30:** Paul gets back on track to point out his main purpose is not to baptize or bring attention to himself, but to point to Christ.
- **January 31:** What inspiration can you take from Paul's addressing of divisions in Corinth to navigate areas of conflict in your own life?
